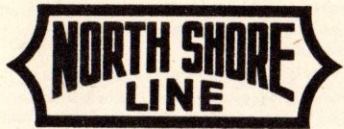

. . . to help you enjoy your liberty or furlough while at Great Lakes and also to be of assistance to visiting relatives or friends. How to go! What to see! Compiled by the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railway -- **THE NORTH SHORE LINE** -- the only railroad directly to and from Chicago's Loop entertainment and shopping district.

HOW TO TRAVEL

to and from  
Great Lakes Naval Training Center

THE NORTH SHORE LINE, a high-speed electric railroad operating over tracks of the Elevated System in the City of Chicago, is the only direct service between Chicago's Loop and the Naval Training Center at Great Lakes, Illinois.

The NORTH SHORE has 2 lines between Chicago and Great Lakes . . .

- 1 - the SHORE LINE ROUTE passing through cities and towns along the west shore of Lake Michigan;
- 2 - the SKOKIE VALLEY ROUTE which branches west and north from the Shore Line at Howard St. north city limits of Chicago.

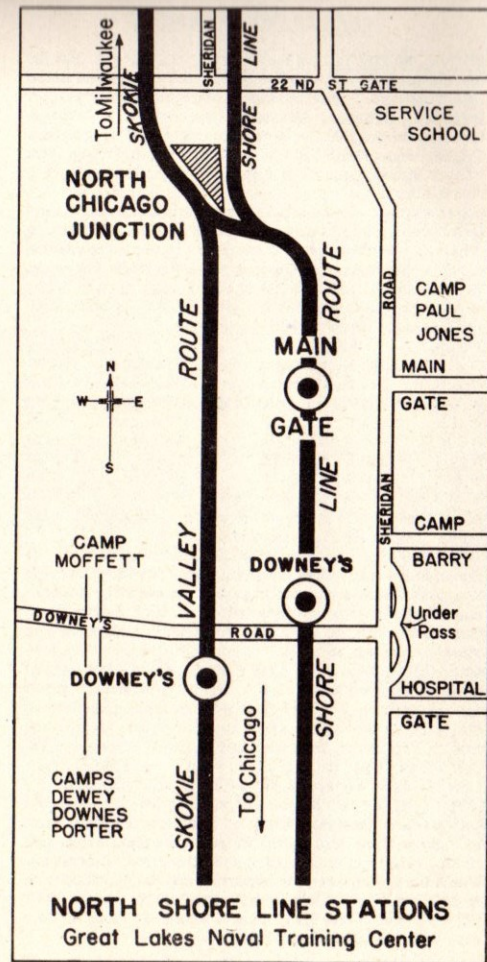
All NORTH SHORE LINE STATIONS in Chicago are on the Elevated Railroad. The principal downtown station is located at 223 South Wabash Avenue (Adams and Wabash). Stations at Great Lakes are directly adjacent to Naval Training Center gates.

NORTH SHORE LINE TRAINS are frequent between the Chicago Loop and Great Lakes . . . approximately every 30 minutes during "rush" hours and then every hour via the Shore Line Route. Fast schedules are on an hourly basis via the Skokie Valley Route--so no matter when you may want to travel you'll find a train to suit your convenience. Ask North Shore Line ticket agents for timetable of trains.

The North Shore Line also operates trains directly between Great Lakes and Kenosha, Racine and Milwaukee, Wisconsin. In the latter city connections are made with other railroad and bus lines to and from Wisconsin, Upper Michigan, Minnesota and other north and northwest points.




The North Shore Line Terminal in Milwaukee is in the heart of the downtown business district at 6th and Michigan Streets. Stations in Kenosha and Racine are in locations convenient to all sections of those cities.

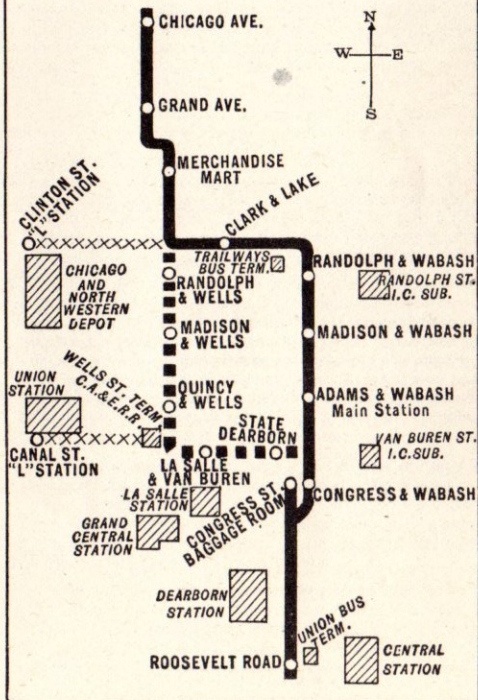
Four (4) North Shore Line Stations are located in the Great Lakes Naval Training Center area. See detailed map on opposite page.

## RAILROAD AND BUS TERMINALS in CHICAGO

North Shore Line trains in Chicago operate over tracks of the Elevated Railroad, close to all steam railroad and bus terminals, but there is one thing you will want to remember . . . southbound trains coming into Chicago from Great Lakes, for example unload at "L" stations on the west and south sides of the Loop, while northbound trains load at stations on the east and north sides of the Loop. See map of North Shore Line Chicago Loop Stations on opposite page.

Following is a list of steam and electric railroad and bus terminals in the Chicago Loop area, with directions as to how to reach the nearest outbound North Shore Line station when transferring from another railroad or bus station. Shown also are directions where to leave inbound North Shore Line trains most convenient to the same connecting railroad and bus line terminals.

LaSalle Street Station  
(LaSalle and Van Buren Streets)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Board any 'round-the-loop "L" train directly from "L" platform at the LaSalle St. Station; get off at North Shore Line Adams & Wabash Station.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at LaSalle & Van Buren; direct platform entrance to station.

Grand Central Station  
(Harrison and Wells Streets)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Walk 3 blocks north to Quincy & Wells "L" Station; board any 'round-the-loop "L" train and get off at North Shore Line Adams & Wabash Station - OR - walk 5 blocks north to Adams Street and 5 blocks east to Adams & Wabash.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at Quincy and Wells Sts. Station; walk 3 blocks south on Wells St. to Grand Central Station.

Dearborn Station  
(Dearborn and Polk Streets.)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes

Walk 2-1/2 blocks north on State Street--one block east of depot--to Congress and Wabash Sts. station.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes

Leave North Shore Line trains at State-Dearborn Station; walk 2 blocks south on Dearborn St. to Dearborn Station.

Union Station  
(Jackson Boulevard and Canal Street)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes

Board any 'round-the-loop "L" train at Canal Street "L" station, reached by direct subway from Union Station; get off at Adams & Wabash - North Shore Line station.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes

Leave North Shore Line trains at Quincy and Wells Sts. station; walk 3 blocks west on Jackson Blvd. - OR - transfer to west side "L" trains at Quincy & Wells and get off at Canal Street "L" station where passageway leads directly into Union Station.

North Western Station  
(Madison & Canal Street)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes

Board 'round-the-loop "L" trains at Clinton and Lake Sts. "L" station, at the north end of the Northwestern Station; get off at Adams & Wabash North Shore Line station - OR - walk 9 blocks east on Madison Street to North Shore Line station at Madison and Wabash.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes

Leave North Shore Line trains at Madison and Wells Sts. station; walk 3 blocks west on Madison Street to Northwestern station.

Central Station  
(Roosevelt Road & Michigan Ave.)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Walk 2 blocks west to North Shore Line's Roosevelt Road Station.

INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Rd. Station; walk 2 blocks east to Michigan Ave.

Aurora and Elgin Station  
(Wells St. South of Jackson Blvd.)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Board any 'round-the-loop "L" train directly from "L" platform at station to Adams & Wabash.  
INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at Quincy and Wells; direct platform entrance to station.

South Shore Line  
(Illinois Central Suburban Stations)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Leave trains at Randolph St. station; walk 1 block west to Randolph & Wabash, North Shore Line Station.  
INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at State-Dearborn Station; walk 2 blocks east to Illinois Central, Van Buren & Michigan, Suburban Station.

Union Bus Terminal  
(Roosevelt Rd. & Wabash Ave.)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Walk 1 block west to North Shore Line Roosevelt Road Station.  
INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Road Station; walk 1 block east.

Trailways Bus Depot  
(East Randolph St. between State & Wabash)

OUTBOUND - North to Great Lakes  
Walk 1 block east to North Shore Line Randolph and Wabash Streets Station.  
INBOUND - South from Great Lakes  
Leave North Shore Line trains at Randolph & Wells Station; walk 4 blocks east to Trailways.

ACADEMY OF SCIENCE - Lincoln Park

Thousands of exhibits depicting the natural history of Chicagoland. Admission free. Open week days 9 am to 5 pm. Sundays & Holidays 1 pm to 5 pm. Transfer from North Shore Line trains at Belmont Ave. to Elevated . . . get off at Armitage Station; walk 3 blocks east to Clark St.

ADLER PLANETARIUM - Foot of Roosevelt Rd. at Lake Michigan.

The thrilling story of the universe - the stars and the planets. Open week days 10 am to 5 pm. Sundays and Holidays from 2 pm to 5 pm. Planetarium shows week days at 11 and 3. Sunday and Holidays at 2.30 and 3.30. Admission free Wed. Sat. Sun. & Holidays. Other days 25¢ plus 5¢ tax. Leave North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Rd. Station; walk east to Lake Michigan.

ART INSTITUTE - Adams & Michigan (Grant Park) . . .

The second largest collection of masterpieces in the United States. Open week days 9 am to 5 pm. Sundays and Holidays 12 noon to 5 pm. Admission free Wed. Sat. & Sun. Other days 25¢ plus 5¢ tax. Leave trains at Randolph & Wells; take any 'round-the-loop "L"' train to Adams & Wabash; walk 1 block east.

BASEBALL - Sox at Comiskey Park . . . 35th & Shields.

Transfer at Belmont Ave. to South side "L" or Subway; get off at 35th St. Station; walk four blocks west.

BASEBALL - Cubs-Wrigley Field-Addison & Sheffield. South-

bound, leave North Shore Line at Wilson Ave. . . then direct platform transfer to "L" to Addison Street. North-bound, take "L" to Wilson Ave., where all North Shore Line trains stop.

BATHING BEACHES - Open approx. July 1 to Labor Day depend-

ing on temperature of water . . . hours 9 am to 9.30 pm. No charge for bathing. Beaches are located at 9800 south (Calumet); 87th St. Jackson Park (64th St.); 57th St.; 49th St.; 31st St.; Roosevelt Rd.; Ohio St. (600 north); Oak St. (1000 north); North Avenue (1600 north); Fullerton & Outer Drive (2400 north); Montrose-Wilson (4400 north). Beach houses with locker facilities and showers at Calumet; 64th St.; 31st St.; Roosevelt Rd.; North Ave. and Montrose-Wilson.

CHICAGO ATTRACTIONS

BOARD OF TRADE - Jackson and LaSalle . . . Chicago's

tallest building; the nation's leading grain exchange . . . 15 minute illustrated lectures given to gallery visitors at frequent intervals during trading hours. Visitor's gallery open Mon. thru Fri. 9.30 am to 1.15 pm; Sat. 9.30 am to 12 noon. Board of Trade Observatory, highest point in Chicago is located on 45th floor. Leave North Shore Line trains at Quincy & Wells; walk 1 block east.

BUCKINGHAM FOUNTAIN - Foot of Congress St. in Grant

Park . . . said to be more spectacular than the fountains of Versailles, France. Free display. Operates from about May 20 to September 30. Major displays from 4 pm to 6 pm and 9 pm to 9.30 pm except Sept. 10 to 30 displays are in the evening at 8.30 pm. Leave North Shore Line trains at Congress & Wabash or Adams & Wabash . . . short walk east to Grant Park.

CHICAGO HISTORICAL SOCIETY - Lincoln Park . . . the

finest historical collection in America. Admission free on week days. Open 9.30 to 4.30 week days; 12.30 to 5.30 Sundays. 25¢ plus 5¢ tax on Sundays and Holidays. Transfer from North Shore Line trains at Belmont to a south side "L" . . . ride to Sedgwick Station; walk 2 blocks east to Clark Street.

CHICAGO NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM (Formerly Field

Museum). Roosevelt Rd. and Field Drive . . . Acres of exhibits illustrating Anthropology, Botany, Geology and Zoology. Open 9 to 6 daily. Conducted tours Mon. to Sat. at 2 pm. Admission free Thurs. Sat. and Sun. Other days 25¢ plus 5¢ tax. Get off North Shore trains at Roosevelt Road Station; walk 3 blocks east.

CHICAGO PUBLIC LIBRARY - Randolph and Michigan Ave.

Over 2,000,000 priceless volumes. Leave North Shore Line trains at Belmont Ave.; direct platform transfer to Jackson Park or Englewood Subway trains; ride to Washington St. Station; use Randolph St. exit and walk 2 blocks east.

CHICAGO STADIUM - 1800 West Madison St. . . . the home

of Blackhawk Ice Hockey Team. Scene of boxing shows, indoor circuses, tennis, basketball and other sports events. Leave North Shore trains at Randolph and Wells. Transfer free to west side Logan Square-Humboldt Park "L" trains. Get off at Madison St. Station; half a block from the Stadium. Returning, take "L" train directly to Adams & Wabash Station of the North Shore Line.

CHICAGO ATTRACTIONS

CHICAGO STOCK EXCHANGE - Monroe and LaSalle Streets

Financial Center of the middle west. . . . . Open to visitors Mon. to Fri. 9 to 12; Sat. 9 to 11 am. Get off North Shore at Madison & Wells; walk one block east to LaSalle St.

COLISEUM - 16th and Wabash Ave. Scene of numerous trade

shows, sporting events, walkathons, rodeo, circuses, etc. Get off North Shore trains at Roosevelt Road Station; walk one block east and four blocks south.

GARFIELD PARK CONSERVATORY - Central Park Ave. and

Lake Street . . . strange exotic plants from all over the world . . . special flower shows on scheduled dates. Open free daily, Sundays and Holidays 8 am to 5 pm . . . During special shows hours are 8 am to 10 pm. Leave North Shore Line at Randolph and Wells; transfer free to west side, Lake Street "L" trains to Garfield Park.

GRANT PARK CONCERTS - Foot of 11th St. in Grant Park

Eight week series of free band concerts from the end of June to the end of August. Presented on Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings. Admission free. Get off North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Road Station; walk 3 blocks east.

HORSE RACING - In season at various tracks located in the

Chicago area. Watch the newspapers for dates. Tracks and how to reach them as follows-

Sportsman's Park and Hawthorne Track

Both reached by west side Douglas Park "L" trains to 52nd Ave. then bus. Transfer from North Shore Line trains direct to the "L" at Randolph and Wells.

Arlington Park

Special trains via Northwestern Railway from Madison St. Terminal. Get off North Shore Line trains at Madison & Wells; walk directly west on Madison St. to Northwestern terminal.

Washington Park

Special trains via Illinois Central R.R. Leave North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Road Station; walk 1-1/2 blocks east to the Central Station.

INTERNATIONAL AMPHITHEATRE - 40th and Halsted Sts.

Home of the International Live Stock Show; scene of many famous exhibitions and sports events. Transfer from North Shore to south side "L" trains to Indiana Ave. . . . take Stockyards Branch trains to Halsted St. Returning, leave "L" trains at North Shore Line Adams & Wabash Station.

CHICAGO ATTRACTIONS

LINCOLN PARK ZOO - 2000 north, just east of Clark St.

More than 2,500 mammals, birds and reptiles, including "Bushman" world famous gorilla. Open free 9 am to 5 pm daily . . . including all holidays. Located also in Lincoln Park is the Conservatory open free daily, including holidays, 8 am to 5 pm. Take Chicago Motor Coach buses Nos. 53 or 56 from the Loop directly north to Zoo and Conservatory.

MERCHANDISE MART - 229 North Bank Drive . . . a world's

fair all under one roof. Open to visitors on guided tours starting every few minutes between 9 am and 4 pm from the Main Lobby - Mondays thru Fridays. Each tour takes 1 hour and 15 minutes. North Shore Line trains in both directions stop directly at the Merchandise Mart.

MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY - On the Lake at 57th

St. Eight acres of exhibits showing relation of science and industry . . . many of them you operate yourself. Take a trip through the coal mine, grey iron foundry, print shop and 3,000 ft. model railroad. Open 9.30 to 5.30 week days; Sun. until 7 pm. Admission free to all but coal mine and Nickelodeon (weekly program of old time movie thrillers.) Transfer from North Shore to southbound Jackson Park "L" or Subway train at Belmont Ave.; get off at end of line; walk six blocks north or take northbound street car directly to Museum.

MUSIC - Concerts by world famous bands; recitals and famous

singers; ballets; choral groups, give scheduled appearances frequently in Chicago . . . watch newspapers for dates. Several of the outstanding music halls and how to reach them are . . .

Orchestra Hall - 220 South Michigan Avenue; featuring the

Chicago Symphony Orchestra and other famous orchestras; soloists and choral societies. Get off North Shore Line trains at Adams & Wabash; one block east to Michigan Avenue; 1/2 block south.

Civic Opera House - Wacker Drive at Madison. Ballets,

opera companies, musicians, singers and orchestras from all over the world . . . leave North Shore Line at Madison & Wells; walk 2 blocks west to Opera House.

Kimball Hall - University of Chicago operated - 306

South Wabash Avenue . . . thrilling lecture concerts. Ride to Adams & Wabash; walk 1 block south to Kimball Hall.

## CHICAGO ATTRACTIONS

**ORIENTAL INSTITUTE** - at the University of Chicago, 58th St. and University Ave. . . . ancient civilizations brought to the 20th Century . . . the Gateways of Nebuchadnezzar . . . Babylon . . . Thebes. Admission free at all times. Open 1 to 5 Mon. through Fri. - 10 to 5 Saturdays - 11 to 5 on Sun. Transfer from North Shore at Belmont Ave. to Jackson Park "L" or Subway; get off at University Ave. Station; walk 5 blocks north.

**RADIO STATIONS** - Many national radio broadcast shows emanate from Chicago studios . . . a limited public audience is generally permitted but it is necessary to secure admission tickets in advance. Telephone or write the studio you would like to visit and tell them the show you care to see. A list of principal radio stations in Chicago and their addresses and telephone numbers are shown below:

All of these radio stations are within easy access from North Shore Line, Chicago Loop stations.

**RIVERVIEW PARK** - the most outstanding amusement center of the middle west; roller coasters, rides of every description; visit the Midway; thrills galore; open during the summer months. Roller skating only in winter. Leave North Shore Line trains at Belmont Ave.; transfer to westbound street car direct to park.

**SHEDD AQUARIUM** - on the Lake front at 14th St. Denizens of the deep from the seven seas . . . wierd grotesque, colorful and awe inspiring . . . freak collections from mid-western states . . . a sight you cannot afford to miss. Admission free on Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays; other days 25¢ plus 5¢ tax. Open daily 10 am to 5 pm. Leave North Shore Line trains at Roosevelt Rd; walk east to Aquarium.

**SOLDIER FIELD** - 16th St. and Columbus Drive . . . Chicago's huge stadium where are scheduled many sports events, football games, circuses, rodeos, midget auto races, music festivals, religious ceremonies and attractions that thrill. Watch the newspapers for programs and dates. Maximum seating capacity 135,000 (with seats on field). Arena 300 x 887 feet. Use North Shore Line to Roosevelt Road Station; easy walk east directly to Field.

## CHICAGO ATTRACTIONS

**STOCKYARDS** - the heart of the meat packing industry in America. Regularly conducted tours Mon. to Fri. every half hour 9 to 2.30 at the following companies: Armour & Co. 43rd and Racine Ave.; Swift & Co., Racine and Exchange Ave. Tours require 1-1/4 hours . . . free . . . Transfer from North Shore Line trains at Belmont Ave. to "L" or Subway southside trains to Indiana Ave., then Stock Yards Branch trains to Swift's or Armour's station.

**SWIMMING** - (NATATORIUMS) - Six natatoriums, open all year are located in the following Chicago Parks:

Instructions in Swimming, life-saving, water-polo, water ballet and other water activities are offered at these parks for men, women, boys and girls. For hours and other information telephone the individual parks listed above shown in the Chicago telephone directory under "Chicago Park District."

**ZOO (BROOKFIELD)** - Located approximately 14 miles west of the Chicago Loop. No cages . . . animals are in their native habitat, separated from spectators by wide moats. Open 10 am to 6 pm daily; admission free. Transfer from North Shore Line trains at Randolph & Wells Sts. to west side Douglas Park ("L"); go to end of line at Oak Park Ave. Station and transfer to West Towns Railways buses . . . OR . . . ride the Burlington Railway from Union Station, Chicago directly to the zoo.

**ZOO (LINCOLN PARK)** - See description and travel directions listed in this folder under heading "Lincoln Park Zoo."

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Chicagoans are always proud to welcome members of the armed forces. Many theatres, movies, public institutions and promoters of events of interest offer free or reduced rate tickets to men and women in uniform. When you visit any of these places be sure to ask about them.

## MILWAUKEE ATTRACTIONS

Milwaukee abounds with places of interest for the visitor and sightseer . . . beautiful parks, museums, sports arenas, tennis, riding, polo, movies, football, golf, dancing and numerous attractions worth your attention. Just a few of them are listed below:

**RIVERVIEW ROLLER RINK** . . . roller skating every evening including Sundays . . . low cost . . . walk 1 block west from North Shore Line Terminal to 7th Street; take trolley bus north to North Ave. transfer to North Avenue Trolley Bus direct to door.

**WISCONSIN ROOF DANCING** . . . dancing every evening. Walk 1 block north from North Shore Line Terminal to 6th and Wisconsin Avenue.

**GEO. DEVINE'S MILLION DOLLAR BALLROOM** . . . Name band dancing every evening. Walk 1 block north from Terminal to Wisconsin Ave.; take the "Green Bus" marked Sherman Blvd. direct to door at 24th and Wisconsin Ave.

**WASHINGTON PARK ZOO** . . . One of the largest in the United States . . . monkey island nationally known . . . hundreds of specimens . . . the Park boasts a beautiful Band Shell where free concerts in season are given by noted artists . . . tennis courts . . . picnic grounds . . . magnificent floral displays. Walk 1 block north from North Shore Line Terminal to Wisconsin Ave.; take "Green Bus" marked Sherman Blvd. direct to park.

**PUBLIC MUSEUM** . . . Famous armament displays . . . rare coins . . . ancient and modern Indian trophies . . . wild life and animal history all in diorama . . . Free lectures every Saturday and Sunday . . . walk 1 block north and 2 blocks west from North Shore Line Terminal to Museum at North Eighth and West Wisconsin Avenue.

**LAYTON ART GALLERY** . . . Unusually fine art display masterpieces . . . statuary . . . pottery . . . open week days 9 am to 5 pm; Sundays 2 pm to 5 pm . . . Free admission. Walk 1 block north from Terminal to 6th and Wisconsin Ave.; take any eastbound street car or bus to Jefferson Street; walk 1 block north.

## MILWAUKEE ATTRACTIONS

**JUNEAU PARK** . . . an unusual view of Milwaukee's Harbor, frequently called the "Naples of America". Coast Guard station and Yacht Harbor . . . take Clybourn St. trolley bus #13 in front of North Shore Line Terminal - across 6th St. - directly to the park.

**STATE FAIR PARK - COLISEUM** . . . home of Wisconsin's Annual State Fair . . . horse and stock shows . . . trotting and auto races. . . amusements . . . hockey games in season. Walk 2 blocks north from Terminal to Wells St.; take Wells-West Allis cars direct to gates.

### RAILROAD AND BUS TERMINALS IN MILWAUKEE

**UNION DEPOT (CMSt&PRR)** - Third and Everett Streets. Walk 3 blocks east from North Shore Terminal.

**NORTHWESTERN DEPOT (C&NWRY.)** Wisconsin Ave. & Astor St. Take Clybourn St. trolley bus No. 13 at North Shore Line Terminal - across 6th St. - directly to depot.

**PERE MARQUETTE DOCK** (Terminal-carferry to Ludington) Located at 1940 S. Kinnikinnic Ave. . . . take trolley bus #13, across street from North Shore Line Terminal; ride east to North Water Street; transfer to southbound Delaware Ave. car #15.

**WISCONSIN & MICHIGAN DOCK** (Clipper ship to Muskegon) Located at 601 E. Erie St. . . . Take Clybourn St. trolley bus #13, across street from North Shore Line Terminal; ride to Milwaukee St. and transfer to southbound Delaware Ave. street car; get off at Erie St.; walk 4 blocks to dock.

**GREYHOUND BUS TERMINAL** (North 3rd & West Michigan St.) Walk 3 blocks east from North Shore Line's Sixth and Michigan Sts. terminal . . . bus lines leaving and arriving at this terminal include Greyhound, Kenosha Motor Coach Lines, Midland Coach Lines and Milwaukee & Lake Shore Bus Lines.

**UNION BUS TERMINAL** (631 North Sixth Street) . . . walk one-half block north from North Shore Line Terminal . . . bus lines using this terminal include Badger Coach Lines, Cardinal Bus Lines and Peoria-Rockford Bus Lines.
