INTRODUCTION

To aid all who are seeking suitable stopping places during their summer vacations, this booklet is issued by the Southern Pacific Company, and contains in condensed form descriptions of various California resorts and some in Southern Oregon.

Nearly all of them are within from an hour's to a night's ride from San Francisco or Los Angeles. A few of the places are within from twenty-four to thirty-six hours' journey.

The particulars given include the name and location of the resort (hotel, cottages, or camp with tent-houses); how reached from stations, auto-stage fare; name of manager; the accommodations provided; rates for rooms and meals; facilities for sports and amusements—fishing, hunting, golf, etc., and points of interest in vicinity.

The information, so far as it relates to names and hotel prices, was obtained to as late a date as possible, but of course cannot in every case be guaranteed.

Outing Resorts

ALAMEDA BEACHES AND PACIFIC CITY— SAN FRANCISCO BAY

The sunny beaches of Alameda, along the eastern shores of San Francisco Bay, are frequented by many thousands of people and offer a playground with which all visitors to the bay region should become familiar. They are easily reached from San Francisco by Southern Pacific ferry steamers to Alameda Pier, there connecting with electric trains. Fare 18 cents each way.

NEPTUNE BEACH—On Central Avenue, Alameda. Main entrance at Southern Pacific Webster Street Station. A quarter-mile beach for surf bathing, with large floats close to shore. Life guards in attendance. Large three-story bath house, over 400 feet long, contains thousands of lockers and individual dressing rooms, assuring privacy and satisfactory accommodation. Swimming tank, 300x75 feet, in white mosaic tiling; water heated to seventy degrees and filtered continuously, producing crystal clear water. Diving platforms; spring boards; high dives; swimming races and aquatic exhibitions by experts and amateurs. Band concerts Sunday and during vacation time. Cafeteria with large seating capacity; also inviting refreshment booths, giving good service at reasonable prices. Children's playground, clean sand, swings, slides and gymnastic apparatus. Scenic railroad $\frac{1}{4}$ -mile long; captive airplane, merry-go-round and five other amusement devices. Amusement concessions and spacious dance hall accommodating 600 couples; orchestra music. Palace Theater, an annex of Neptune Beach, provides high class entertainments and moving pictures. Season opens April 2. Admission 10 cents, children 5 cents.

SCHMIDT'S COTTAGE BATHS—On Central Avenue, Alameda, one block east of Southern Pacific Fifth Street Station and one block west of Webster Street Station. Tide-washed beach for surf bathing. 1000 rooms for bathers. Concrete swimming tank 125x75 feet; swimming instructor in attendance. Refreshment stand and tables for picnic parties. Special attractions Sundays and holidays.

SUNNY COVE BEACH — On Central Avenue, Alameda, just west of Southern Pacific Fifth Street Station. A 200-foot beach for surf bathing—500 rooms—fresh water showers. Concrete tank 130x75 feet. Dancing Pavilion 80x30 feet. Refreshment stands. Admission free. Bathing suits 25 cents.

ALAMEDA BEACH—On Central Avenue, Alameda, one block west of Southern Pacific Fifth Street Station. Tide-washed beach for surf bathing. 100 rooms. Admission free.

PACIFIC CITY—On San Francisco Bay, opposite Burlingame and San Mateo stations on Southern Pacific "Coast Line," about a half hour's ride from San Francisco. Pacific City has a bathing beach over half a mile long, a board walk 1,400 feet in length. The beach embraces 250 acres of water. The pitch of the beach,

which is of fine white sand, is gradual, and the water is of comfortable, even temperature. This is the only bathing beach resort on San Francisco side of bay. More than 90 acres of ground are devoted to exhilarating amusements. A roller coaster, a "chute the chutes," that goes straight into San Francisco Bay, a large free playground with swings, games for children under trained attendants; a merry-go-round, eating places, a dancing pavilion, a "Dodgem," automobile ride—these and other amusement features give ample opportunity for clean fun and thrills. Regular band concerts. Opens May 30th. This resort seeks to create a reputation as a modern amusement resort operated under a careful censorship. The climate is warm and free from fog. Admission week days, free; Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, 10 cents.

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LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK

LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK comprises a region of wild beauty lying about 45 miles east of Redding and Red Bluff on Southern Pacific "Shasta Route." Lassen Peak, 10,577 feet elevation, is the only active volcano in continental United States. On May 30, 1914, it renewed its volcanic activity, believed to have last occurred two hundred years ago. At varying intervals it emitted volumes of smoke, with ashes and rock, the latest explosive eruption occurring on May 22, 1915. Since then innumerable fissures in the mountain have provided vent holes through which Lassen's internal forces continually escape in steam.

In 1905 Lassen Peak was created a National Monument, and in 1916 the region round about was set aside as the Lassen Volcanic National Park. Roads within the Park are now under construction by the Government, the present means of exploring the interior being by horse and foot trails. Cinder Cone, Chaos Crags, Snag Lake, Butte Lake, Lake Helen and Juniper Lake, with scores of lesser lakes, creeks and streams amidst beautifully forested surroundings, are some of the many attractions of this new playground, while various areas within the Park, including the Devil's Kitchen with its hundreds of boiling springs and geysers, Bumpass' Hell, Boiling Lake and Steamboat Springs, in addition to ice caves and mud caldrons, will fascinate the visitor with their novelty and weirdness.
