



## INFORMATION FOR PERSONS ENTERING CANADA FROM THE UNITED STATES

FROM THE UNITED STATES

Immigration Regulations

American tourists and visitors are cordially invited to Canada and do not require passports to enter the Dominion. Citizens of the United States still retain their pre-war freedom to enter and travel in Canada without new restrictions. In order to facilitate crossing the international boundary in each direction, citizens of the United States by naturalization should be prepared to present their naturalization certificates and citizens of other countries should be prepared to establish the classification to the United States without by record of admission to the United States without by record of admission to the United States without her prepared to establish their legal admission to the United States either by record of admission or certificate of reentry.

#### CUSTOMS REGULATIONS Travelers' Baggage

General Provisions-Wearing apparel, articles of personal adornment, toilet General Provisions—Wearing apparel, articles or personal adornment, toilet articles and similar personal effects of persons arriving in Canada may be passed free, without entry at Customs, as travellers' baggage, under the provisions of the Customs Tariff, but this provision shall include only such articles as actually accompany and are in the use of and as are necessary and appropriate for the wear and use of such persons for the immediate purpose of the journey and present comfort and convenience, and shall not be held to apply to merchandise or articles intended for other persons or for sale. Merchandise for Sale, when brought into Casada because is rubicet to duty and to entry a Customs in the accompanyment. Canada as baggage, is subject to duty and to entry at Customs in the same manner

Canada as baggage, is subject to duty and to entry at Customs in the same manner as goods imported by freight or express.

Cigars and Cigarettes in personal baggage of non-residents—Fifty cigars or less, two hundred cigarettes or less and two pounds of manufactured tobacco or less, in open packages, or in cartons, may be delivered free of duty.

Goods valued at not more than one hundred dollars included in the baggage accompanying residents of Canada returning from abroad after an absence from Canada of not less than 48 hours and acquired by them for personal or household use or as souvenirs or gifts, but not bought on commission or as an accommodation tax on value of such exempt articles and \$2.00 per 1,000 cigarettes.

Returning residents must state in their declaration in Canadian currency the

price actually paid for all goods purchased abroad in respect of which exemption is claimed, and must state a fair market value for all goods obtained abroad other han by purchase, such as gifts.

#### **Tourists' Outfits**

Temporary admission—Persons visiting Canada for a limited period of time, for health or pleasure, may bring with them such articles of tourists' outfits or sportsmen's equipment as they may require while in Canada for their own use

or sportsmen's equipment as they may require while in Canada for their own use and not for gain or hire, upon reporting same to the Customs Officer at the Canadian frontier port of entry, subject to the following provisions:

Boats (portable), Canoes, Outboard Motors, Tents, Camp Equipment, Radios, Phonographs, Musical Instruments, Guns, Rifles (Not including revolvers or pistols)

Fishing Tackle, Golf Clubs, Tennis Racquets, Cameras (still and motion picture, as well as a reasonable quantity of film for use therein), and Typewriters, previously used by a tourist and imported by him for his personal use and actually in his possession at the time of his arrival in Canada, as well as dogs and other animals and birds imported by tourists solely for hunting purposes or as domestic pets, may e admitted without deposit.

Permits for Firearms for Tourists
Under the Defence of Canada Regulations aliens are not permitted to carry firearms in Canada or to have them in their possession, but, tourists who wish to go to Canada for hunting, trap or gun club shooting, etc., are given the opportunity of obtaining a special permit issued by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at

Tourists who wish to take advantage of this concession are advised to com municate a sufficient period in advance of their proposed visit to afford ample time for inquiry as to their bona fides (should this be considered necessary), and for the permit when issued to be forwarded to the Collector of Customs at the Canadian frontier port prior to their arrival.

Applications should be addressed to the Commissioner of Customs, Ottawa, Canada, or to the Commissioner, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ottawa, and should state in each individual case:

Name, residence and occupation; Purpose and duration of visit;

Destination in Canada; Canadian frontier port of arrival and date, and

Description, make and serial number of each firearm for which permit is required.

## INFORMATION FOR PERSONS ENTERING THE UNITED STATES FROM CANADA

#### **Immigration Regulations**

American citizens do not require passports either to leave or reenter the United States. It is recommended however that they be in possession of such personal papers and other documents as may be helpful in establishing that they are American citizens. A birth certificate is the best form of evidence.

Allens must be in possession of passports issued by the Government of the country to which they owe allegiance, which passports must bear proper visa of nearest United States Consul.

Customs Regulations

Residents of United States may take into Canada their wearing apparel and other personal effects and upon return to United States are entitled to have the same admitted free of duty. Residents of United States upon return must declare all articles acquired abroad, in their baggage or on their person, whether by purchase, by gift, or otherwise, and whether dutiable or free of duty.

Each returning resident of the United States is entitled to an exemption from duty on articles up to a total of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) in value acquired outside the United States under the following conditions, if declared when the

outside the United States under the following conditions, it declared when the resident arrives at the United States port of entry:

1. Provided they have been outside the United States over forty-eight hours.

2. Provided they have had no previous exemption for the past thirty days.

3. Provided the articles are not intended for sale, or as an order for others, or prohibited by law.


Provided they are acquired as an incident of the foreign journey. Foodstuffs, cigarettes, tobacco, 100 cigars, and not over one wine gallon of distilled spirits, wines or malt liquors (provided the quantity is not prohibited by State law) may be included in this exemption.


When a husband and wife, or a parent or parents and minor or financially dependent children, travel together, the articles included within the exemption may be grouped and allowance made without regard to which member is the owner; PROVIDED, that the group exemption shall not

member is the owner; PROVIDED, that the group exemption shall not include servants.

7. Articles intended for future delivery must be declared in writing at the port of entry at the time of the resident's return to the United States.

Special provision is made in the case of sealskin garments. To save yourself embarrassment, inquire about the regulations of U. S. Customs Inspector at port of entry before you leave the United States, or if you are a traveler from Canada, before you enter the United States.
