MINNESOTA, the Gopher State, was first explored by French traders and missionaries in the late 17th century. Organized as a territory in 1849, it became the 32nd state in 1858. Rich in natural resources, Minnesota produces iron ore from the famed Mesabi range, pulpwood, grain crops and dairy products. The state is most famous, however, for its bountiful, beautiful waters. Renowned as the "Land of 10,000 Lakes," Minnesota is visited annually by millions of vacationers.

WISCONSIN, the Badger State, was first visited by the French in the 1630's. Ceded by Britain to the United States following the American Revolution, it became the 30th state in 1848. Known as "America's Dairyland," Wisconsin produces more milk and cheese than any other state. Wisconsin's abundant recreational resources attract many vacationers and sportsmen.

MINNEAPOLIS (Population 434,400, alt. 818 ft.) was first visited in the 1680's by Father Hennepin, who discovered St. Anthony Falls on the Mississippi River. Begun as a mill town in 1856, today Minneapolis, along with its twin city St. Paul (population 309,828, alt. 723 ft.), is a manufacturing, educational, and financial center. The Twin Cities metropolitan population is almost 2,000,000.

Minneapolis is the home of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, the Tyrone Guthrie Theater, the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, and the Walker Art Center. St. Paul serves as the state capitol and is the site of the Winter Carnival, Minnesota State Fair, and the Como Park Zoo. Among the area colleges are the University of Minnesota, Hamline University, Augsburg, Concordia, Macalester, St. Catherine, and St. Thomas Colleges. Major sports attractions include the Minnesota Twins baseball team, the Minnesota Vikings football team, and the Minnesota North Stars hockey team.

SUPERIOR (population 32,237, alt. 638 ft.) grew from a a French fur-trading settlement into an important industrial and transportation center. The leading Wisconsin port, Superior is the western terminus of the St. Lawrence Seaway. The Indian Head Country region to the south includes Brule River State Forest and Pattison State Park, while Billings Park fronts the St. Louis River. Superior is the home of Wisconsin State University and the Douglas County Museum.

**DULUTH,** (population 100,578, alt. 631 ft.) was a French trading post named for Sieur Du Luth, who came there in 1679. Duluth became an important shipping center with the development of the Mesabi and Vermillion ranges. To the north, the Arrowhead country offers many attractions. The Duluth branch of the University of Minnesota and the College of St. Scholastica are located here, as are the Chisholm and St. Louis County Museums, the Tweed Gallery, the Duluth Zoo, and Spirit Mountain Ski Resort. The International Folk Festival is an annual event.
